


Jeremy Donovan is a proud Kuku-Yalanji man with family connections to several other language groups

After working as the Spokesperson and National Development Director for GenerationOne, in 2014 Jeremy was appointed as Chief Executive Officer of the Non-profit, to lead the campaign to end the disparity through employment. Jeremy led and saw the government's adoption of the National VTEC employment model.

In September 2015, Jeremy stood down as Chief Executive of GenerationOne to pursue the growth of his own business as a consultant that engages with Government, Corporate and Community, providing advice on cultural safety, cultural understanding and cultural engagement. Jeremy is also an accomplished and published artist, musician and poet.

Jeremy's artwork in 2017 was published by Nescafé and featured on their Nescafé coffee tins and distributed nationally making Jeremy Donovan one of the most recognised artists in the country. In 2018, Jeremy Donovan was also featured and published by leading retailer David Jones on all of their gift cards. Jeremy has produced works for LendLease shape, Suncorp bank and Officeworks. In 2019 Jeremy completed two of the largest individual pieces of Aboriginal artwork measuring 14.1m for LendLease and the historic Barangaroo business district.

He has spoken and performed extensively throughout Australia and the world at some of the most prestigious International venues and events.




The Artwork - Who we Are



This body of work was consigned to capture and reflect Queensland Symphony Orchestra (QSO). Painted in the office of the QSO, I had the unique opportunity to engage with musicians, QSO staff and supporters. The painting was influenced by these conversations and interactions. This painting depicts the whole of the QSO. In each individual panel, the Orchestra is depicted using different colours to reflect the roles and the variety of instruments played. The central panel features the hands around the orchestra, which is symbolic of the people that come to experience the QSO and the music.

Blue features across all three panels and represents the land on which the QSO is based and pays respect to both the Turrbal and Yuggera peoples and the custodianship of this beautiful region. Greens are the mountains and the rainforests of QLD. Fine detail within the greens are symbolic of our Far North Queensland Shield designs. There are three of these on the middle panel; they are our Elders and are symbolic of three individuals who were just acknowledged for their 40-year service to the orchestra. Across the top of the painting, the fine white dot work is symbolic of the Dark Sparkles (Milky Way) in the sky - a Dreaming story belonging to my family. Beyond the stars are the musical notes silhouetted in the sky acknowledging that sound is infinite. The seven Purple circles on each panel painting are symbolic of the dedicated teams behind the music. QSO is so much more than what people get to see, hear and enjoy. There are tireless teams behind the magic of the music. These seven circles are also the Seven Sisters connecting my Grandmother dreaming.

Having spent my career as a musician and artist, and privileged to play alongside classical and symphony orchestra musicians, the creation of this piece was a special experience.







Message from Reconciliation Australia

It is critical to not only uphold all five dimensions of reconciliation, but also increase awareness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures, histories, knowledge, and leadership across all sectors of Australian society.

This Reflect RAP enables Queensland Symphony Orchestra to deepen its understanding of its sphere of influence and the unique contribution it can make to lead progress across the five dimensions. Getting these first steps right will ensure the sustainability of future RAPs and reconciliation initiatives and provide meaningful impact toward Australia's reconciliation journey.

Congratulations Queensland Symphony Orchestra, welcome to the RAP program, and I look forward to following your reconciliation journey in the years to come.

The ancient DNA of the First Nations peoples in Queensland is the foundation of Queensland's cultural identity, and through this plan, the QSO will elevate First Nations arts, a priority of the Queensland Government's 10-year strategy, Creative Together.

Message from Queensland Symphony Orchestra

The significance of the Year 2023 to the operations and aspirations of Queensland Symphony Orchestra cannot be underestimated. However, what we are yet to do is harness the power of this large arts organisation to signify to all our constituents more broadly that QSO is committed to a long and enriching exploration of First Nations cultures. This journey will be marked by actions, goals, performances, projects and people. And, on every part of this journey, we will strive to act with integrity, understanding, sincerity and consistency.

As the largest performing arts company in Queensland, we are an orchestra for all Queenslanders. The service we provide, whether concerts, education, engagement, professional development, social cohesion, or creative leadership, is for everyone and it is incumbent upon us that we ensure it is especially available to those who find our music the most challenging to access. The tyranny of distance, the discrepancies in socio-economic background, and the differences in creative traditions and norms will be the reasons that drive QSO to do more and more over time in support of First Nations recognition, integration and creativity.

As a company which puts music first, the most valuable thing we can do is share our music, absorb the music of others, and use this non-verbal language to communicate deeply across cultures. As our journey deepens and ultimately gains momentum, we make a pledge here to lead with compassion, to listen closely, and to find ways and places in all that we do for our First Nations kindred spirits to become part of QSO evermore.

Our Business

Queensland Symphony Orchestra is an orchestra for everyone, performing throughout the great state of Queensland. At home at South Bank located in the ABC Centre, or on tour throughout the regions, Queensland Symphony Orchestra is currently home to 140 talented musicians and staff, and we enjoy the support of an outstanding list of stakeholders, supporters, partners, and subscribers. Currently our organisation has no known staff who identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people. Our intention is to secure the employment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff as we move into our next strategic plan phase from 2024-2028 and this will appear as a goal within that Strategic Plan. We present a broad range of classical music concerts on the mainstage, support our opera and ballet colleagues through pit services, and provide music education experiences and community events.

First Nations engagement, collaboration and whole-of-organisation commitment will be led and championed by Chief Executive Yarmila Alfonzetti, the designated RAP Champion. The core deliverables and promises will sit within the CEO portfolio at Queensland Symphony.





Our RAP

QSO occupies a unique place in the cultural landscape of Queensland, and more broadly as one of the five state symphony orchestras in Australia. Because of this leadership role in the arts, and because culture is at the core of who we are, QSO finds a natural alignment and significance in First Nations cultures. However, this organisation's interest in developing and implementing a Reconciliation Action Plan is not limited to our pre-disposition to the performing arts. We are a company of 140+ people who, due to the nature of music education and our industry, have come from across all areas of Australia and beyond, and we therefore bring with us a complex biography of links to place and home and people who are, very often, far away. At is core, the QSO RAP is about connection.

Through this RAP journey, it is our intention to connect the people within this organisation to each other through music, and connect us all to our First Nations friends, colleagues, communities, stories, places and, ultimately, our home.

The RAP will be implemented through a set of actions and goals with regular reporting and communications to ensure the journey is shared. QSO has developed a RAP Working Group which will meet regularly to oversee the governance and implementation of the Reflect RAP. In addition, QSO has a well-established set of full company meetings and communications tools where information is consistently shared and acknowledged. We also have an excellent track record of delivering on promises as the nature of our business requires an end-date to all that we do.







Our Connections To Art

QSO has recently been fortunate enough to engage visual artist Jeremy Donovan to lead a creative painting exploration for the orchestra by developing an immersive piece of artwork uniquely for QSO.

The synergies of QSO and Jeremy are very aligned especially considered his impressive international performance experience and our mutual love of music. Jeremy's career commenced playing the digeridoo in a classical form and he has performed with orchestras over the last 20 years. One highlight was performing at the opening ceremony of the 2000 Olympics.

QSO engaged Jeremy to provide a First Nations Art piece for QSO. This piece exists in three large panels which form part of a full story when combined but can also be able to be used separately to make other stories/QSO Stories. This artwork can be seen throughout this RAP document, as well as in concert programs and brochures.

We will also be using this artwork on new long ties for male musicians as well as pocket squares. We will also be looking at having a neutral piece of clothing, such as a pashmina, for women that can be used in many ways.


Everyone at QSO – Board, musicians, administrative staff, supporters, friends – was invited to participate in the process of creating this very special piece of QSO artwork. Each member of the company contributed to the creation of this painting, with our story, our personal dot, and our ideas. Our individual piece of artwork provides a cultural competence and understanding across the whole of QSO.

- Jeremy Donovan QSO Immersive Artwork with the entire company 17 24 November 2022




Reconciliation Action Plan Working Group

The QSO RAP Working Group has been actively engaged since the beginning of 2021. This large group is an even mix of QSO permanent musicians from the Orchestra and members of the Business Team. The Group is voluntary and meets monthly where each of the three sub-committees – Community & Education, Artistic, Business – share experiences, actions and information.

As one of the few informal working groups within QSO, the discussions are enjoyable, honest and open; all members are enthusiastic about bringing First Nations culture to life at QSO. Each one of us has Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander personal friends and colleagues so we have a good source of anecdotal stories and lots of ideas to share.

Our obligation to support and guide this journey for our co-workers, as well as act as custodians of our initiatives and projects, means that we have a shared commitment to seeing success in this space. With Group members from across all areas of the business, we feel confident that we can shepherd sponsorship, funding, endorsement and participation from right across our Company. Our interest in First Nations cultural awareness and recognition will not dim over time, but only grow as we realise that this cultural journey is equal in importance to all other cultural work at QSO.
