#### **QSO FIRST NATIONS ARTWORK WHO WE ARE**

The First Nations artwork that appears on QSO attire is reprinted with permission and drawn from Who We Are by Jeremy Donovan. Jeremy speaks about the work here:

"This artwork was commissioned to capture and reflect the Queensland Symphony Orchestra (QSO). Painted in the office of the QSO, I had the unique opportunity to engage with musicians, QSO staff, and supporters. The painting was influenced by these conversations and interactions. This painting depicts the whole of the QSO. In each individual panel, the Orchestra is depicted using different colours to reflect the roles and the variety of instruments played. The central panel features the hands around the orchestra, which is symbolic of the people who come to experience the QSO and the music. Blue features across all three panels and represents the land on which the QSO is based, and pays respect to both the Turrbal and Yuggera peoples, and the custodianship of this beautiful region.

Greens are the mountains and the rainforests of Queensland. Fine detail within the greens is symbolic of our Far North Queensland Shield designs. There are three of these on the middle panel; they are our Elders and are symbolic of three individuals who were just acknowledged for their 40-year service to the orchestra. Across the top of the painting, the fine white dot work is symbolic of the Dark Sparkles (Milky Way) in the sky—a Dreaming story belonging to my family. Beyond the stars are the musical notes silhouetted in the sky, acknowledging that sound is infinite. The seven purple circles on each panel are symbolic of the dedicated teams behind the music. QSO is so much more than what people get to see, hear, and enjoy. There are tireless teams behind the magic of the music. These seven circles are also the Seven Sisters, connecting my Grandmother's Dreaming.

Having spent my career as a musician and artist, and being privileged to play alongside classical and symphony orchestra musicians, the creation of this piece was a special experience."

#### LISTENING GUIDE

#### **LUDWIG VAN BEETHOVEN (1770-1827)**

Overture to Egmont, Op.84

Beethoven's Egmont Overture is a powerful and dramatic work, composed as part of his incidental music for Goethe's play Egmont. The story follows Count Egmont, a Dutch nobleman who stands against Spanish oppression, ultimately sacrificing himself for the cause of freedom. Beethoven, deeply inspired by themes of heroism and resistance, infuses the overture with a sense of struggle, sorrow, and ultimate triumph.

The piece begins with a dark and ominous introduction, representing Egmont's fate, followed by a surging main theme that builds tension. The music grows in intensity, culminating in a triumphant, almost revolutionary conclusion, symbolising victory even in the face of death.

#### LISTENING GUIDE

#### **HOLLY HARRISON (BORN 1988)**

#### Jammed

The title Jammed has two meanings. It refers to the main musical riff which is repeated and reimagined throughout: it is implied that the players are part of an improvised jam session, freely drawing from funk, rock, and metal styles. The work also embraces the idea of 'jam' as something which is 'stuck'. This is heard in the piece through jarring brass chords and rapid changes between sections, which could be likened to a CD skipping or vinyl warping.

#### CAMILLE SAINT-SAËNS (1835-1921)

Concerto No.1 in A minor for Violoncello & Orchestra, Op.33

I. Allegro II. Larghetto III. Allegro

Saint-Saëns' Cello Concerto No.1 is a masterpiece of lyricism and virtuosity, widely regarded as one of the finest works ever written for the instrument. Unlike traditional concertos with separate movements, this work unfolds in a continuous, seamless structure, giving it an exciting sense of momentum and cohesion.

The concerto opens with an electrifying flourish from the solo cello, immediately drawing listeners into its passionate world. The first section is bold and dramatic, while the second section offers a lyrical contrast, with tender, song-like themes. The final section is filled with dazzling technical complexity, as the cello soars and dances toward a thrilling conclusion.

#### PYOTR ILYICH TCHAIKOVSKY (1840-1893)

Symphony No.1 in G minor, Op.13 (Winter Daydreams, abridged)

- I. Allegro tranquillo (Dreams of a winter journey)
- II. Adagio cantabile ma nontanto (Land of desolation, land of mists)
- III. Scherzo: Allegro scherzando giocoso (Scherzo)
- IV. Finale: Andante lugubre; Allegro moderato; Allegro maestoso (Andante lugubre)

Tchaikovsky's First Symphony, *Winter Dreams*, was written in 1866 by a young, newly appointed teacher at the Moscow Conservatoire. Encouraged by Director Nicholas Rubinstein, Tchaikovsky worked obsessively on the piece, sacrificing sleep and health. Despite his inexperience, the symphony showed remarkable maturity and premiered successfully in 1868. It became one of the first Russian symphonies to gain public acclaim. Tchaikovsky revised it multiple times, yet retained deep affection for it, calling it "a sin of my sweet youth." Influenced by Mendelssohn, especially in its Romantic, landscape-evoking character, the symphony's Russian identity is strongest in its evocative, subtitle-bearing first movements

#### **ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES**



#### Umberto Clerici Conductor

After a career spanning more than 20 years as a gifted cello soloist and orchestral musician, Umberto Clerici has consolidated his diverse artist achievements to rapid acclaim as a conductor. Umberto is now the Chief Conductor of the Queensland Symphony Orchestra. In addition to this role, Umberto is in great demand internationally. Recent and future highlights include conducting Daniil Trifonov with New Zealand Symphony Orchestra, Elgar's cello concerto with Steven Isserlis for the Volksoper Vienna, and debuts with Orchestra del Teatro Massimo in Palermo and Orchestra Regionale Toscana. Umberto has also curated a three-week series with the Sydney Symphony for 'Symphony Hour' and returned to the podiums of the Dunedin, Melbourne and West Australian Symphony Orchestras. He also looks forward to his second collaboration with Opera Queensland with Puccini's La bohème.



### Bennett Tsai

Described as "electrifying...flawless freshness" (Süddeutsche Zeitung), Australian cellist Benett Tsai was a top prizewinner at the 2022 Grand Prix Emanuel Feuermann and joined Young Concert Artists' roster after winning the 2023 YCA Susan Wadsworth International Auditions. Named a VC Artist on The Violin Channel and recipient of The Stern Young Artist Award, his New York debut was named one of the best of 2024 by New York Classical Review. He has performed as soloist with the Berlin Radio Symphony, Sinfonia Lahti, and Canberra Symphony, and collaborated with artists including Esa-Pekka Salonen, Emanuel Ax and Jean-Yves Thibaudet. A student of Clive Greensmith at The Colburn School, Benett is mentored by Ralph Kirshbaum and Steven Isserlis. He plays a 1719 Giuseppe Guarneri 'filius Andreae' cello on loan from a generous benefactor.



### Ed Le Brocq

Ed Le Brocq is a writer, musician and broadcaster. He was born on the White Cliffs of Dover and began playing music at six years old. Ed studied music in Manchester, Berlin and London with scholarships from the Munster Trust and the German government, played professionally in the UK and Hong Kong and moved to Australia in 2003. He is the presenter of ABC Classic's Weekend Breakfast. Ed has written five books, including Cadence, about his journey by bicycle from England to Hong Kong with only a violin for company, Danger Music, describing his year teaching music in Afghanistan, and Sonam and the Silence, a children's book about the importance of music. Ed's books have been shortlisted for several prestigious awards, including the Prime Minister's Literary Awards. Ed was born Emma and transitioned just before his fiftieth birthday. Better late than never.
