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WELCOME

Welcome to the 2021 Season Closing Gala. All of us here at Queensland Symphony Orchestra are glad you have joined us tonight for what will be a special evening of music-making.

While it is not exactly the evening of music we originally planned over 15-months ago, it will be a thrilling performance none-the-less! As with so many other things in our lives, the original concert was impacted by COVID-19 and the scheduled conductor and soloist were not able to join us, resulting in a change of program.

Yet these changes have allowed us to re-imagine the program, and given you, our audiences, the opportunity to hear the Orchestra in three orchestral showpieces under the baton of Umberto Clerici.

Umberto has only been conducting for three years, building on his stellar career as a soloist and principal cello in leading orchestras internationally and in Australia. I first heard Umberto play with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, and every performance there or elsewhere showcased his great musicality and joy in performing. These qualities are totally evident in his conducting and his intimate knowledge of the orchestra. This concert is his third project with QSO this year, ahead of three appearances next year including Mahler's First Symphony in June.

We commenced the 2021 Maestro series with the Orchestra playing two great symphonic works and we close it in similar style. After Rossini's sparkling overture, we will hear Debussy's masterly impressionistic depiction of the sea's shades, moods, and colours. And to bookend Ravel's *La Valse* in February, the concert finishes with Richard Strauss's great sequence of waltzes written for his great comic opera and which pays homage to the elegance and grace of 19th Century Vienna.

It's not quite the concert we had planned at the beginning of the year, but we hope you enjoy this beautiful performance that wraps up the spectacular, inspiring and at times challenging year that was 2021.

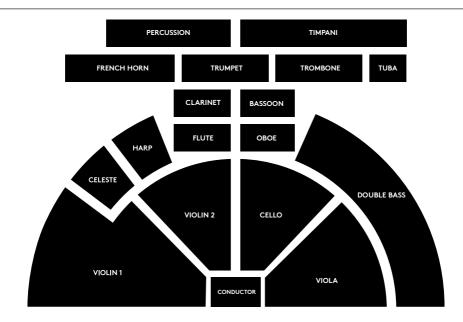

IF YOU'RE NEW TO THE ORCHESTRA



WHO SITS WHERE

Orchestras sit in sections based on types of instruments. There are four main sections in the symphony orchestra (strings, woodwinds, brass, and percussion) and sometimes a keyboard section.

STRINGS

These instruments produce sound by bowing or plucking stretched strings.

First/Second Violin Viola Cello Double Bass Harp

WOODWIND

Wind instruments produce sound by being blown into.

Flute/Piccolo Clarinet /E-flat Clarinet/Bass Clarinet Oboe/Cor Anglais Bassoon/Contrabassoon

KEYBOARD

Keyboard instruments are played by pressing keys. Piano Celeste

BRASS

Brass players create sound by vibrating their lips. When this vibration is pushed through large brass tubes, it can create significant noise.

French Horn Trumpet Trombone / Bass Trombone Tuba

PERCUSSION

These instruments create sound by being struck or shaken. Some instruments just make a sound; others play particular pitches.

Timpani, Bass drum, Snare drum, Cymbals, Glockenspiel, Xylophone, Vibraphone, Tam-tam, Triangle, Sleigh Bells.

BEFORE WE BEGIN

Before the performance begins, get to know a few musical terms in the Listening Guide.

Opera semiseria	an Italian genre of opera. The story is usually serious but has a comic character to lighten the mood.
Pentatonic scales	a musical scale with five notes.
Crescendo	the music gradually getting louder.
Fortissimo	means to be played very loudly.
Leitmotif	a recurrent theme throughout a musical or literary composition, associated with a particular person, idea, or situation.
Waltzes	a piece of music with a rhythm of three beats in each bar (boom-cha-cha).

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LISTENING GUIDE

Gioachino Rossini (1792–1868)

Overture to La gazza ladra (The Thieving Magpie)

The scene: Italy, 1817. A famous composer is held hostage in an opera house. The villain, a director who demands the completion of a show-stopping overture.

Guarded by four stagehands, the imprisoned composer pens his score. He conjures the military roll of a snare drum, anticipating an execution. The chirp of a piccolo, much like a mischievous bird. A rocking waltz that pecks away at the string section, propelling the overture to its brassy finale.

Finished pages of the score are hurtled from the window. A frantic copyist leaps from the ground, grasping at the papers falling from the sky. There's not a minute to spare: the overture is scheduled to be performed that very day! Later, the composer would write: "In default of pages, they were ordered to throw *m*e out of the window."

This calamity could be found in an **opera semiseria** – a production combining elements of comedy and drama. And this is the genre of 1817 opera *La Gazza Ladra*, which Rossini completed while imprisoned in La Scala, Milan on the day of its premiere. (Yes, really.)

The overture to *La Gazza Ladra – The Thieving Magpie –* brings lightness through that chirping piccolo and rocking waltz. But it also boasts an element of tragedy when a servant girl is to be executed for stealing silverware. (This is also true.)

Luckily, a last-minute discovery reveals the magpie was the thief all along. And through Rossini's last-minute score, the girl's life is spared. Village (and opera director) rejoice.



Claude Debussy (1862-1918)

La mer (The Sea)

The Great Wave off Kanagawa is an evocative seascape. In the foreground, curling white waves threaten to crash over a wooden boat; Mount Fuji observes the weathered beast from a distance. Fittingly, Hokusai's 1830's woodblock print was selected as cover art for *La Mer* – a 1905 score through which Debussy portrays an impression of the water not unlike Hokusai's. In place of wood and pigment, the French composer uses woodwind textures and Japan-inspired **pentatonic scales** to craft his suite of symphonic sketches.

From Dawn to Noon on the Sea opens with rumbling drums and sparse instrumentation, the calm before the storm. Debussy's themes become angular and leap from high notes to low, much like a boat skipping to safety from Hokusai's waves. A **crescendo** rises through the orchestra, majestic as the morning sun.

Instruments are scattered in *Play of the Waves,* darting over each other before crashing together in a whirlwind, or growing still against a rippling harp. In *Dialogue of the Wind and Sea,* massive forces of nature fuel each other through the sink and soar of **fortissimo** strings, brass, and percussion.

While listening to *La Mer*, you might picture Hokusai's wave, or the brushstrokes of Turner or Monet, whose art also inspired Debussy to create his vision of an "endless and beautiful" sea.

Richard Strauss (1864–1949) Suite from Der Rosenkavalier (The Knight of the Rose)

The Suite from *Der Rosenkavalier* is an elaborate concoction of the characters and **leitmotifs** first portrayed in Richard Strauss' 1909-10 comic opera. Set in 18th century Vienna, it reveals a breathtaking love affair between Count Octavian and the field marshall's wife. You'll hear their passion through the luscious strings and horns, which open this suite like a Hollywood romance.

Meanwhile, Baron Ochs wants to romance wealthy love interest Sophie. Octavian becomes the middleman: he must present Sophie with an enchanting silver rose on the Baron's behalf. The beautiful flower twinkles through flute and harp, as magical as John Williams' score to *Harry Potter*. What nobody expects is love at first sight – Octavian and Sophie fall for each other! Passion **waltzes** from one lover to the next before they're united in a happy yet bittersweet ending.

Although Strauss composed the opera, he may not have written the suite. It's said to be the work of conductor Artur Rodzinski, who in 1944 led the New York Philharmonic through a performance of this condensed orchestral arrangement. The following year, Strauss allowed the suite to be published, and we now enjoy this elegant version in the concert hall.

ARTIST BIOGRAPHIES



Umberto Clerici Conductor

Following from a career spanning more than 20 years as a gifted cello soloist, chamber and orchestral musician, Umberto Clerici is consolidating his multi-faceted and diverse skills as a conductor of increasing renown.

Umberto began his cello studies with the Suzuki method at the age of five, later continuing with Mario Brunello, David Géringas and Julius Berger. Umberto received several international prizes including the Janigro Competition in Zagreb, the Rostropovich in Paris and, in 2011, the Tchaikovsky Competition in Moscow making him only the second Italian cellist ever being honoured in the history of the prize, after Mario Brunello.

As a cello soloist, Umberto debuted at the age of 17 performing Haydn's D Major cello concerto in Japan, and has since appeared with an array of renowned orchestras internationally including the Philarmonia Wien, St. Petersburg Academic Philharmonic, Russian State Orchestra of Moscow, "I Pomeriggi Musicali" (Milan) and Zagreb Philharmonic.

After 4 years as the Principal cello of the Teatro Regio di Torino, Umberto became Principal Cello of the Sydney Symphony Orchestra from 2014 - 2020. Whilst with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra, Umberto continued his solo appearances with orchestras throughout Australia including the SSO (notably an interdisciplinary project centred on Strauss' *Don Quixote* in 2017) and the Brahms' Double Concerto (2018), the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra, Canberra Symphony Orchestra and Sydney Youth Orchestra. Umberto also enjoys his position as the Artistic Director of the Sydney Youth Orchestra Chamber Ensemble.

As a conductor, Umberto made his debut in 2018 conducting the Sydney Symphony Orchestra at the Sydney Opera House with Dvorák's New World Symphony. Since then, Umberto has conducted the Izmir and Istanbul State Orchestras, Hong Kong Sinfonietta, Orchestra d'Aosta, Sydney Symphony Orchestra (Swan Lake, Mahler Symphony No. 4), Queensland Symphony Orchestra (Beethoven 6, Stravinsky's The Firebird) and Melbourne Symphony Orchestra (Schumann's Cello Concerto, Mendelssohn Italian Symphony and Schumann Violin Concerto). This season highlights include returns to the Queensland, Melbourne, Tasmania and Sydney Symphony Orchestras.

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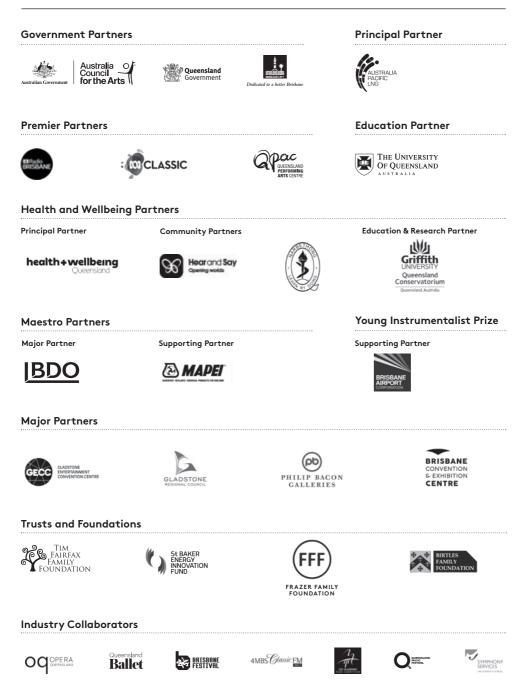
